

Department Budget









Hotel Liaison

Michael Mathis was hired to serve as the Hotel Liaison for the City of Sharonville in February of 2021. The position is a part-time civilian staff position within the Police Division.

Mission

The hotel liaison will work with the lodging industry; and with the City of Sharonville and its partners to create a safe, clean, and prosperous environment for the lodging industry. This includes those who work for the lodging industry, for the guests who use the lodging industry, and the greater Sharonville community. The hotel liaison will adopt a role of coordination, facilitation, and education to promote best practices. The hotel liaison will make referrals to the appropriate agencies for enforcement of existing rules and laws. The hotel liaison will work to improve communication and understanding between all involved as they move towards the goals of the program.

- Safe environment – This includes crime prevention and criminal enforcement. This includes fire prevention and fire suppression. This includes building and zoning issues that could impact safety. This includes the Police Department, State of Ohio Public Safety (Liquor), Sharonville Fire, State of Ohio Fire Marshal, and the Sharonville Community Development Department.
- Clean environment – This includes creating a hygienic environment through health and sanitary inspections. This involves our partners in Hamilton County Health, Sharonville Community Development (clean lots, junk motor vehicles), and the State of Ohio Fire Marshal.
- Prosperous environment – This includes working to aid the Lodging Industry to be successful in their business models. The Hotel Liaison will facilitate issues with Sharonville Tax Department, Sharonville Community Development, Convention Center, and other local/regional entities/associations.

Hotel Engagement Strategies

Strategies Implemented

- 1) Hawthorne effect – This is a basic principle of psychology that people’s behavior changes when they know they are being observed. At the most basic level – having a hotel liaison stop in at the hotels on a regular basis lets the hotels know that they are being monitored. This should logically aid, at least a little bit, in better behavior.
- 2) Relationship building – Having the hotel liaison stop in on a regular basis aids in developing relationships and trust. This facilitates communication. Good communication provides for information flow about crime and disorder that can assist the police division in stopping criminal behavior. The Hotel Liaison can make recommendations to the hotels about practices that may improve operations.
- 3) Criminal Intelligence – The Hotel Liaison’s background in law enforcement allowed him to develop intelligence information for the police division. More proactive law enforcement strategies were implemented in 2023.
- 4) Governmental partnerships – The Fire Department, State Fire Marshal, Hamilton County Health, Community Development, Economic Development, and the Police Department all work holistically to try and improve operations.
- 5) The Chronic Nuisance Property or Premises Ordinance – This ordinance places a responsibility on property managers and owners to aid the city in regulating crime and disorder on their properties.

Impact of Strategies - 24.16% DECREASE IN CFS 2021-2023

There are many issues that must be considered or factored into what drives calls for service to our hotels. Some are outside of city control. However, the police and fire calls for service showed marked improvement in 2023 over past two years.






Deployments by Month

Criminal Investigations

Significant Cases

23-1270 – Rape– Isaacs – 11-yr-old girl claims that her father had sexually abused her when she was younger. After an in-depth investigation, the father was indicted for one count of Rape and two counts of GSI.

23-2394 – Aggravated Arson – Wilson – A subject that lived in the Sharon Mobile Home Park went into a neighbor’s trailer while the victims were out and started a fire on the kitchen stove. SFD extinguished the fire before more damage was done (other than in the kitchen). During the previous night, the suspect had been involved in an altercation with one of the residents. The subject was indicted for one count of Aggravated Arson and one count of Arson.

23-00893 – Wilson – Felonious Assault – Subject that lived on the 2nd floor of Sharondale Woods Apt. went outside of the apartment directly below him and used a handgun to shoot numerous times into the apartment. After the suspect was identified, SPD arrested him. During the interview, he admitted to shooting into the apartment (sliding glass doors) and stated that his neighbors below him were putting “gases” into his apartment. The subject admitted that he had hit his head prior to the incident and was highly intoxicated. The suspect was indicted on one count of Felonious Assault.

23-2555 – Rape/GSI investigation – Three juvenile females allege that the suspect had sexually touched them while taking them out for lunch. The suspect was one of the victim’s stepfather’s uncle. The incident took place several years prior to it being reported. It was discovered that the suspect was already in prison for an unrelated sexual offense. While the investigation was still open, the suspect died in prison.

23-1891 – Breaking and Entering/Safecracking – Morgan – A subject was breaking into numerous businesses throughout the Tri-State and stealing money from ATMs using power tools. Different police agencies were involved with the investigation and a suspect was finally developed. The suspect was finally indicted on numerous counts of Breaking and Entering and Safecracking.

23-1102 – Felonious Assault/Robbery/Kidnapping – Morgan – A female employee of the McDonalds on Kemper Rd. was opening the store when a subject came up behind her with a gun and forced her into the restaurant. After getting some money, the suspect struck the employee numerous times in the head with his gun. He then zip-tied her and fled the scene. A suspect was developed through video and DNA. The suspect was responsible for numerous such crimes throughout Hamilton Co. The suspect was ultimately indicted on 3 counts of Agg, Robbery – 3 counts of Robbery – 3 counts of Kidnapping – 3 counts of Felonious Assault – and 6 counts of Having Weapons While Under Disability.





Officers shall collect data regarding the race and gender of all self-initiated traffic stops. This information should be derived from the officer's observations and perceptions or from known information services, i.e., LEADS, OHLEG, CCH, or other known and trusted resources. Domestic Violence Enhanced Response Team (DVERT)

Sharonville Police Department is part of this trauma focused crisis response team that provides an on-call, on-scene response to domestic violence survivors to avert gender-based violence and to prevent children from growing up in violent homes. DVERT™ provides on-scene safety planning, access to resources, empowerment, and engagement in on-going support services

Use of Force Review

A review of the use of force incidents that occurred in 2023 has been completed.

Of the 514 arrests made, there were 11 uses of force, or 2.1% of arrests involved the use of force. Some incidents had more than one type of force applied, and each was counted separately.

As a result of force being applied, five suspects received medical treatment.

During incidents, one officer received injuries requiring medical treatment and/or time off work.

Late last night, while you were sleeping, third shift officers recovered some stolen property and made a few arrests with the help of some new technology.




